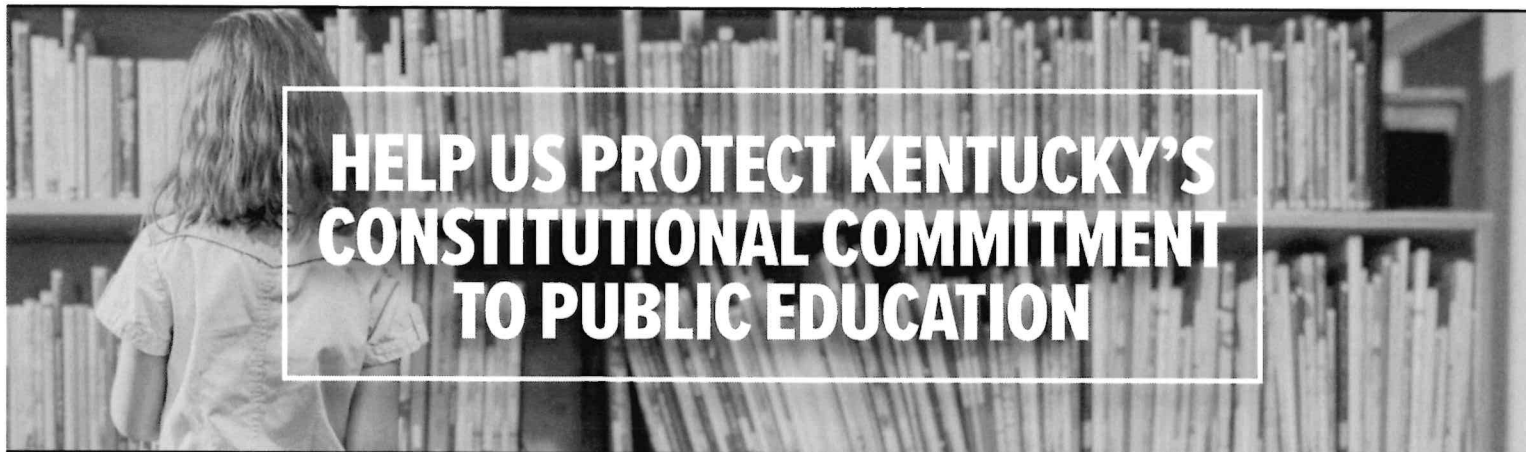

Vote NO ON AMENDMENT 2



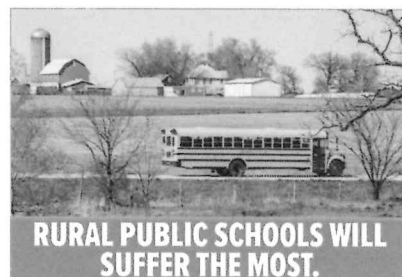
TAKES CRITICAL RESOURCES FROM PUBLIC SCHOOLS.

Private school vouchers come from funds for public schools. The legislature already has shown a willingness to underfund public schools. In the recently enacted budget, it left a \$1.1 billion gap in public school funding. (Kentucky Center for Economic Policy, 7/24)



VOUCHERS CREATE RUNAWAY BUDGETARY COSTS.

For Kentucky, establishing a Florida-style voucher program would cost \$1.19 billion annually from the state budget. That equals the cost of employing 9,869 educators and staff in Kentucky public schools. (Kentucky Center for Economic Policy, 7/24)



RURAL PUBLIC SCHOOLS WILL SUFFER THE MOST.

The state's poorest rural areas are hit the hardest because lower property valuations make them more dependent on state dollars for public education. The result is tax dollars leaving rural districts to pay for private education elsewhere. (Kentucky Center for Economic Policy, 7/24)
